FALL 2022 Capital Improvement Report

Springreen Drive South & Sunset Drive Reconstruction Project

In the Spring of 2022, this project was awarded to Eastern Iowa Excavating in Cascade, Iowa. The contract between the City of Asbury and Eastern Iowa was set at right around \$1.7 million. Construction has been ongoing through the Spring and Summer and is on track to wrap up this Fall. The project included water main replacement, storm sewer upgrades, street lighting, and total replacement of the existing roadway pavement with new concrete pavement.

Hales Mill Road Reconstruction

The design phase was recently completed for the reconstruction of Hales Mill Road between Brick Mason Lane and Asbury Road. The partially state-funded project includes improvements to the sanitary sewer system, storm sewer system, and new roadway pavement. The City plans to receive bids for the project this Fall, with construction slated to start in the Spring of 2023.

Cloie Creek Trail Project

Construction activity on this new trail was completed during the Summer months by Midwest Concrete from Peosta, Iowa. The City is now looking to formally close out the project within the coming weeks. The trail was recently opened and includes one segment connecting the east side of the Forest Hills Subdivision to the Hales Mill Lift Station, and a second segment connecting Maple Hills Park to the Hales Mill Lift Station. Midwest Concrete completed the project for a little under \$725,000. The trail provides connectivity within the community, as pedestrians can now utilize trails and sidewalks to walk from the Forest Hills Subdivision to the City's Eastern limits.

First conceived by the City's Trails Visioning Committee in 2014, their long range trail development plan with the goal of connecting neighborhoods via trails and sidewalks was ultimately approved by the City. The Cloie Creek trail is crucial to this plan as the it links the Forest Hills, Sun Valley and Maple Hills Subdivisions, Cloie Park, and Maple Hills Park — also connected to Althaus Trail, Asbury Road and Asbury Park. The 10-foot wide, 3,000-foot shared-use trail is intended to be used year-round for walking, running, biking, cross country skiing and snow shoeing. The ADA-compliant project marks another safe, healthy and accessible city amenity for families to enjoy.

Hidden Meadows Overlay

This project has been awarded to River City Paving with a bid just over \$250,000. This project includes the overlay of Budd Road south of Asbury Road and all of Hidden Meadows Drive. The City of Asbury and Dubuque County have an agreement in place to fund their portions of the project respectively. Construction is slated to begin in September and will likely be complete in mid-October.

Springreen Apartments Water Main Upgrades

Bids were recently received for this project and ultimately awarded to Pirc Tobin Construction from Alburnett, IA for just under \$115,000. Upon completion of construction, this new upsized water main will connect with water main on Autumn Drive and Springreen Drive, providing a "loop" in the water main system. Construction is slated to take place this fall, with turf restoration and final completion likely to occur in the Spring of 2023.





GENERAL ELECTIONS

The General Elections will be held on Tuesday, November 8, 2022. Polls are open from 7am until 8pm.

Voting locations are Asbury City Hall and Dubuque County West Campus, located at 13047 City View Drive. Check your Voter Registration to confirm your voting place.

There are several ways to vote absentee. To vote absentee by mail, you may contact the Auditor's Office to request an Absentee Ballot Request form be sent to you by mail. Your completed form must be received by the Auditor's Office by 5 p.m. on Monday, October 24. Voted absentee ballots returned by mail to the Auditor's Office must be received by 8:00 p.m. on Election Night to be counted. To vote absentee in-person, you may vote at the Auditor's Office during regular business hours (8am-4:30pm) from October 19 through October 24, 2022.


WINTER REMINDERS

Prepare for the heating seasion. Have your furnace inspected and serviced annually. Check on fireplaces and do not run space heaters. Test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

Check water meters to make sure water lines are not frozen. All outdoor hoses should be drained and disconnected. Any pipes or faucets in unheated areas should be insulated.

Sidewalks need to be cleared within 48 hours of when the snowfall ends. Check with your snow removal contractor to arrange for removal of snow during the winter months.

During snow emergencies, residents are allowed to park on the odd side of the street on odd number calendar days and park on the even side of the street on even numbered calendar days from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. To help crews with snow removal, residents are encouraged to remove all vehicles from the street.
